
At the moment, I'm completely satisfied with my studies at the VSU and I hope my opinion won't change.

Hello! My name is Andrew Swafford and I am the Fulbright program's English Teaching Assistant this year at Voronezh State University. I arrived in Voronezh in late September and began teaching classes in Applied Mathematics and Mechanics, Computer Science and International Relations departments. I have been very impressed with many of my students' knowledge of English. I was not sure what to expect when I came to VSU, but now that I have spent a couple months teaching and interacting with students I must say that most of them have quite a strong grasp of the language and will definitely be assets to their future employers because of their language skills. Since I am not a real teacher by profession, I have had to learn how to teach as I go along. Sometimes it is difficult, such as when I have not properly gauged the level of my students' comprehension of a topic or when I have underestimated their knowledge of a topic (which is more common), but I do generally enjoy it. I like seeing students show off their English skills in the classroom. When they use interesting or more advanced vocabulary I am always impressed,

since many Americans do not properly use those kinds of words. For example, when I asked a group of students for words and phrases to describe someone's personality, one student offered the beautiful word "gregarious." I thought that was just amazing because I have never heard another English speaker use that word, aside from in literature. Because I have been so impressed by the level of my students this semester, I am excited to see what next semester's groups have to offer.

Now a little bit about me. I am 23 years old and I recently graduated from Truman State University this May. I attended a small liberal arts university in a small town in northeast Missouri where my major was Russian (language, literature, history, culture, etc.) and I completed minors in Linguistics and English. I also studied French for a couple years at university. That is not where I started my Russian studies, though. I began studying the language in high school, so all together I have eight years of experience with Russian. This might sound like a lot of time to study a language and that I should be rather fluent by now, but unfortunately

that is not the case. I love the Russian language and I think it is fascinating, but it is indeed very difficult to learn, so I am not as fluent as I should be. But as the Russian saying goes, "повторение - мать учения."



When I was not at university, I lived with my family in St. Louis, Missouri. It is a beautiful city famous for the enormous steel Gateway Arch which stands as a memorial of the original settlers' expansion into the western half of the country. The city is situated on the banks of the Mississippi River, which famous American authors such as Mark Twain wrote about. It is also famous for

successful professional sports teams and for the Anheuser Bush brewery which makes such beers as Budweiser, Bud Light, Stella Artois, and many others. We have excellent science, art, and history museums, all of which are completely free and open to the public. And St. Louis is home to one of the best zoos in the nation (which is also free). The Jazz and Blues music scenes are very popular in St. Louis and wellknown musicians such as Chuck Berry continue to play at historical music venues all over the city. We are also known for our delicious style of barbecue and there are certain foods that one can only find in St. Louis. We have a special kind of cheese called Provel which we eat on a uniquely thin style of pizza; we make a soft, sweet, buttery cake called Gooey Butter Cake which you must taste in order to understand; and we fry ravioli and dip them in marinara sauce. Aside from the large Anheuser Busch Brewery, there are also many smaller craft beer breweries. You could drink a different kind of beer every day for a year in St. Louis and you still would not have tried them all!

My favorite thing to do at home is to go out with my friends to coffee shops, especially late at night. St. Louis has many interesting cafes and there are always new shops opening up which sell gourmet and specialty coffee. On a typical Friday night we might go to our favorite coffee shop in a vibrant neighborhood full of young, interesting people around 9 pm and after spending a couple hours there chatting and drinking coffee, we might go to a nearby bar and have a couple craft beers. On the weekends we might go see a Cardinals baseball game at the stadium in the heart of downtown St. Louis or catch a concert at one of the hip music venues in the city. Not far outside the city, though, there are several beautiful state parks. Sometimes we decide to drive about an hour to Meramec Caverns to see the large, intricate system of caves, or to one of the nearby locations in Illinois to watch the eagles fly. There is so much to do in and around the St. Louis area that it is difficult to be bored.

My family and I have always lived in St. Louis and we love it. My father works as a policeman and my mother is a programmer. My younger sister who is 19 started her first year at college this Fall. She goes to the University of Central Missouri and studies Psychology. Since this is not my first visit to Russia, my family is no longer afraid of sending me off to this far, mysterious land. They know that I am safe and having a good time here in Voronezh. This is my third visit to Russia and by far the longest, but I am excited to see what else I will learn and what else I can teach my students in the rest of my time here.

We visited a lot of places: the Willis tower - one of the tallest buildings in the world and the tallest building in America; we walked nearby the White House and the Capitol and of course took photos of the Statue of Liberty.



I had time to see everything I wanted: skyscrapers, art museums, Times Square, Brooklyn Bridge, Cloud Gate in Chicago, I even tried Chicago's pizza that looks like a pie and I was also lost in New York subway.
